A Wagon is Awaiting

An "August into September" event is happening in Bunker Hil's midst as sweethearts around the congregation are purchasing school supplies for book bags (that have been handstitched for this activity by seamstress Norma Coe). The downstairs social room's coat rack has a display of the empty bags along with shopping lists. (Some big box stores in the area have reduced prices on their merchandise.).

Downstairs, near the coat rack, is a wagon that is the gathering place for completed bags. From there the bags will be deliered to Mission Central, a depository for UMCOR (United Methodist Committee on Relief) and other mission outlets. Located in Mechanicsburg, PA this agency has, for many years, partnered with Bunker HIII to place our gifts in the hands of receivers worldwide.

The UM Women with Norma's help are sponsoring this campaign. Pleae return filled bags to the wagon in the downstairs social room by Sunday, September 18th. We thank you for being a "behind the scenes" supporter of this project.

A 'Jaunt' to Bring Joy

Our 2022 Lenten offering from April has been awaiting delivery in order to introduce our new, Pastor Katy Mossburg, to the joy of meeting a selection of charitable agencies around our area and to see the scope of their outreach.

Here is an account of the stewardship journey Bunker Hill supporters sponsored. Delivery day number one, August 9th, Kenny Feagans graciously drove Pastor Katy, wife Jeanette, and Leslie and Bonnie Brannon to Martinsburg to begin their visits. The first stop was Safe Haven Child Advocacy Center on Winchester Ave. where Ami Sirbaugh, Child-Family Services Supervisor, greeted them. One important message she offered when she accepted Bunker Hill's donation was "In 2021 during the pandemic Safe Haven saw a 22% increase in the number of children seen for forensic interviews. We had to be able to take precautions, modify our work space, satisfy safely our service obligations despite the threat of COVID." Pastor Katy remarked, "Safe Haven truly considers the comfort, safety, and wellbeing of the children in their care. The obvious care for the children is heartwarming and impressive."

The next delivery was the Martinsburg Union Rescue Mission at 608 W. King Street, where Pastor Tim Guerino was available to provide an insider's tour of the entire operation for Pastor Katy. She was very inspired by their incredible effort to serve the Martinsburg community. From temporary housing to three meals a day, the mission is generous and serves a multitude of people. While visiting, Kenny pointed out that there were many volunteers working around the dining room and kitchen. He was quick to highlight that the mission welcomes laymen to assist after application forms have been completed. Bonnie was amazed to see the bounty of bread and pastry items that were being brought in from local supermarkets to share with the community. How gratifying to see folks converging on the covered back porch to glean these products to use at home. Leslie took time to observe the bales of clothing and textiles that were being loaded on the "Rag Man's" large trailer for sales elsewhere. He learned that this disposal occurs ever other month or so. [NOTE: Even old, tattered items can be a part of this re-purposing.]

Downtown at the Children's Home Society (formerly the Peoples Trust Company Bank), the group toured the two stories and discovered that the building along with the Winchester Avenue properties, and the farm-like acreage in the Pikeside area where the Children's Shelter had previously been located- all are fully owned by the Children's Home Society of West Virginia. Bonnie noticed on the tour a storage corner where 50 plus duffel bags were stacked. Everyone was impressed to see inside a bag (tagged as to gender and age) comfort items like books, stuffed animals, handmade afghans and other merchandise for children who are facing foster care. Various churches and other organizations are responsible for this stash of loving goodies for children in transition. Pastor Katy noted the facility was, "an impressive multi-care organization that helps families care for children. Their commitment to the foster care children is amazing, and the fact that they do all they can to foster the well being of families touched my heart."

At Bethany House (for homeless women and children) in downtown, the group met two employees named Darlene and Bunny. These two are openly fond of their work and rarely miss a day; they do not discuss retirement. Everyone was stunned to learn that plans are in the works for an expansion of the current structure. Pastor Katy observed they have a staff that is obviously invested in helping their clients. She thought it was impressive to see the grants being used to improve services for the women they serve.

A new acquaintance surfaced (nurse Karen Newell) at Good Samaritan Free Healthcare on Raleigh Street. She exhibited zeal as she recaptured the previous weekend's block party and the resources she was able to attract for the neighborhood. As Nurse Karen led the Bunker Hill folks out to the community garden behind the building, Jeanette discovered that a vertical pendant with multiple diamonds on it was missing from her necklace. Pastor Katy swung into action, leaned over, moved a few rocks, and found the missing jewelry. (You can see one of them to hear the whole story.) Pastor Katy stated, "Good Samaritan Free Healthcare center was small in size, but huge in service and commitment. They serve those who need healthcare, they help children, and they have a community garden! Wonderful!!!"

Delivery day number two took place on August 19th. Pastor Katy and Bonnie were joined by Vacation Bible School representatives Meghan Lawlor, Shelly, Mason, David, and Lilly Hughes, Tiffany, Dylan, and Jackson King at Eastern Panhandle Empowerment Center (EPEC) in downtown Martinsburg. VBS participants Mason Hughes and Dylan King presented the VBS offering of \$222.22 from early this summer. VBS Director Tiffany King explained how Bible Schoolers learned about the power of the Holy Spirit and how it helps them to be bold, do hard things, gives hope, helps them be good friends, and helps them live forever. Throughout the week of VBS as the offering was collected, the group hoped the collection would help EPEC empower folks to be able to do all of these things as well. We loved the fun fact that we had 22 children and raised \$222.22 for this organization! Pastor Katy felt, "it was wonderful to meet the faces behind the services of EPEC. The serices they offer are vital to those who suffer from oppression in very serious ways, and empower them to live full lives. Our VBS kids raised money for them, and it was wonderful to see the kids give that check!"

Pastor Katy and Bonnie then traveled to the offices of CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocates) with a check for their operation; they received insight on how the 70 adult partners in their program are stretching to help kids in the court system. Sadly, they learned that several hundred other local children need attention too. Pastor Katy found it very impressive that this organization advocates for children so strongly. What a blessing for the community!

The final leg of day two's journey was to witness Faith Feeding Freedom's weekly lunch distribution to the homeless population in downtown Martinsburg. This large enterprise is handled by volunteers from fraternal organizations and churches with leadership from Toni Weisberg, a local visionary. Items of clothing along with food were available. A short walk from the

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square and the free food allowed the participants from Bunker Hill to see free, safe locker space that the homeless can access. Pastor Katy described Faith Feed Freedom as, "an outstanding organization that treats the homeless and economically challenged as dignified human beings. They offer food, clothing, and fellowship every week, and it was wonderful to see the camaraderie between staff, community, and clients.

While Pastor Katy and Bonnie were out, Bonnie introduced Pastor Katy to Meals on Wheels, another wonderful organization the United Methodist Women remember each year before Christmas with their tray favors.

What joy evolved from Bunker Hill's generosity! Thank you, Bonnie, for coordinating the visits, introducing Pastor Katy to all these organizations, and giving her a tour of Martinsburg! What a privilege to be emissaries to these causes!



Loaves and Fishes

Officials at the local food pantry have asked Bunker Hill to be a part of a "can you bake a pumpkin pie" challenge for the months before their Thankgiving baskets are delivered. For August we struggled to find small packages of powdered pie crust mix (usually Jiffy brand). Sadly, not all of the grocery chains stock this item. We persistied in the search for this reasonably priced (about one dollar) basic and although just shy of our 50 piece goal, received 42 boxes to donate towards the Thanksgiving baskets.
