

May 21st: Berkeley County's Baccalaureate Service; details will be available soon.


"Hooray" for a New Book




BHUMC Youth Being Resourceful






I can remember many Sundays spent at Mammaw and Grandpa's favorite place—the church. The community they have at BHUMC is such a blessing!



Thanks to the generosity of BHUMC members being living examples of God's word, we are actively involved in ministering and sharing God's love to those in need in our community and the world through our time, talents, prayers, and financial gifts. In addition to general operating expenses that keep the church open, your gifts this month have supported the following missions:

> * UMCOR disaster relief: \$385 * Emergency Fund: \$125

* The Table: \$183.50

* Loaves and Fishes: Cans of corn and green beans In addition, we are supporting our Youth as they prepare to help others in the Appalachian Service Project this summer. We have paid an additional \$250 to the loan principle, and had multiple donations to our memorial fund and flower fund. A special thank you goes to two members of the congregation who provided a special gift of \$6,800 to pay off a credit card bill. Their generosity is much appreciated!

Total giving in March= \$21,301.89. expenditures in March= \$23,467, a deficit of \$2,165. In order to meet our monthly expenses, we need \$3,114.75 per week. During the month of March, we averaged \$2,762 per week in the general fund. Our current loan balance= \$36,825.45.

We are waiting to hear form the district regarding the Equitable Compensation Support Grant. We invite you to continue your prayerful support for this endeavor as well your prayerful consideration in how you wish to contribute your time, talents, gifts, and service in the mission of our church.

Loaves and Fishes

The food collection for March has been canned green beans and canned corn in 14-15 oz containers. Bunker Hill's response has been a rousing success. We are waiting to tally numerical results and to determine which veggies seemed to be the favorite among Bunker Hill's shoppers.

Thanks to all donors who think of this community charity when they are at the grocery store. During April the food emphasis will be a "behind the scenes" essential- cooking/vegetable oil- <u>not</u> large containers. FOOTNOTE: Officials at Loaves and Fishes tell us that they service many small families with one or two people. There are only about 25 large families a month that need assistance.
